

We at Atonement are  being invited by God to
step back and take a look at the larger picture and
to color outside the lines that we have drawn.

In the past Atonement has grown through the growth of the nuclear family. As members had more children, church membership went up. These children, on the most part, remained faithful members of Atonement growing their families and thereby the church. The trend has been to have fewer children these days.

Also our society has experienced a loss of loyalty and a rise in the consumer mentality. These have contributed to the demise of attendance and membership of Atonement. It has not helped that we have had 2 pastors die in office, one pastor break the trusting bond that exists between a congregation and her pastor through sexual misconduct and another through a rigid way of doing things. Life has definitely colored outside the lines that the founders of Atonement drew in the beginning. You as the people of God here at Atonement may not have recovered from these losses.

Is it possible that folks are still holding on to the past in a life

defeating way? Is it possible that the communal memory of Atonement clings to how life was before the picture began to go awry? Maybe it's the fear of change and the fear of the unknown that causes us to resist attempts to color outside the lines.

In order to begin to color outside the lines, i.e., go with the flow of the Holy Spirit, we need to acknowledge several things. The first is that it is virtually impossible to walk into the future while we carry a load of regrets and hurts and past painful experiences. We don't forget the hurts, but neither do we dwell on them. Two, and this may be harder than the first, we need to realize that Atonement does not exist for our pleasure. We are not the goal - sharing Christ and the love of God with others is the goal. Filling the pews is not the goal - bringing God's love here on earth is the goal. Raising more money is not the goal - loving our neighbors as ourselves and God with all our heart is our goal.

If you have not noticed, Atonement is on a spiral that could lead to three outcomes:

- perhaps we can gather our wits about us and trust the power of the Holy Spirit and color outside the lines that we have drawn.

- perhaps Atonement has served God's purpose and we must decide to close with grace and dignity and pass the torch to someone else. Not all things human last forever.

- perhaps we can just ignore the trend and see what happens and remain viable long enough to bury our primary members.

Tradition is not bad in and of itself. But doing things the way they have always been done and not remaining open to the movement of God's Holy Spirit has killed organizations larger than Atonement. Blessed by the Holy Spirit, the Christian church has survived for over 2000 years because of its message and because of its adaptability. Martin Luther himself started coloring outside the lines that had been drawn by the church of his time.

New is not evil. Different is not bad. It is possible to learn new things even when we are advanced in age. The spirit of God is not necessarily done with us yet. Will we as a congregation open ourselves up to the possibilities and do the hard work? Yes, hard work, of changing the way we think; of changing the way we do things. Let us discover together the new thing that God calls us to do.

As we read in Isaiah 43, “But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, he who formed you, O Atonement: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. ²When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. ⁵Do not fear, for I am with you; ¹⁸Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. ¹⁹I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.”

Don't miss out on this stimulating conversation of faith.

OFFERING OURSELVES TO SERVE

In 1972, NASA launched the exploratory space probe Pioneer 10. According to Leon Jaroff in *Time*, the satellite's primary mission was to reach Jupiter, photograph the planet and its moons, and beam data to earth about Jupiter's magnetic field, radiation belts, and atmosphere. Scientists regarded this as a bold plan, for at that time no earth satellite had ever gone beyond Mars, and they feared the asteroid belt would destroy the satellite before it could reach its target. But Pioneer 10 accomplished its mission and much, much more. Swinging past the giant planet in November 1973, Jupiter's immense gravity hurled Pioneer 10 at a higher rate of speed toward the edge of the solar system. At one billion miles from the sun, Pioneer 10 passed Saturn. At some two billion miles, it hurtled past Uranus; Neptune at nearly three billion miles; Pluto at almost four billion miles. By 1997, twenty-five years after its launch, Pioneer 10 was more than six billion miles from the sun.

And despite that immense distance, Pioneer 10 continued to beam back radio signals to scientists on Earth. "Perhaps most remarkable," writes Jaroff, "those signals emanate from an 8-watt transmitter, which radiates about as much power as a bedroom night light, and takes more than nine hours to reach Earth." *The Little Satellite That Could* was not qualified to do what it did. Engineers designed Pioneer 10 with a useful life of just three years. But it kept going and going. By simple longevity, its tiny 8-watt transmitter radio accomplished more than anyone thought possible.

So it is when we offer ourselves to serve the Lord. God can work even through someone with 8-watt abilities. God cannot work, however, through someone who quits.

WANTED: CASA VOLUNTEERS

CASA
Rock  of

County volunteers advocate for the best interests of abused and

neglected children who are under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Justice Court System through no fault of their own. CASA volunteers serve as the “eyes and ears” of the court, meeting weekly with the child or children and reporting monthly back to the court. The relationship that the CASA volunteer builds with their assigned child or children and with those family members and collaborators that are a part of the child’s life allows the volunteers to give the court a better picture of the life of the child. Amidst turmoil, instability and unsettled circumstances, CASA volunteers provide a constant, reliable presence and advocate for children who may otherwise slip through the cracks. Our volunteers undergo thirty hours of initial training and commit to serving on a case for a one year minimum. CASA of Rock County is regulated by National CASA Association standards and is governed by Wisconsin CASA statutes.
