From the Pastor...

I asked the question Sunday, "Do we have any Badger fans in worship today?" We had a few. Imagine that. Whatever teams you are a fan of, I bet you know a lot about the team members, their stats, the games won and lost and who the Badgers are going up against next. My brother Bobby used to sign cards, "Love, Bart Starr". I've spent years working that one out in therapy! Anywhoo, you study everything there is about the team you are a fan of.

My question for you is "Are you a fan of Jesus?" Do you follow Jesus Christ with the same vim and vigor? Do you study scripture to learn who Jesus was, and what he did, and all that he said? Have you read the Old Testament to understand what the prophets said of him hundreds of years before his birth? Have you read books to understand what scholars have said about Jesus in the centuries since his death? This may be what it means to "follow" Jesus. Presiding Bishop Mark S. Hanson 2009 EASTER MESSAGE

"Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified ... has been raised." ~ Mark 16:6

When

Magdalene, Mary and Salome came to the tomb, their hopes and fears intersected. They wondered aloud about the impossibly large and heavy stone that presented an obstacle to their immediate plans. Worse, what they thought lay behind the stone was unspeakably devastating. Jesus, who embodied the hope of God's promise in a fully human life, was not simply dead, but crucified -- executed in the most extreme humiliation, a savage mockery of the hope that had lived with him.

But the stone was gone, the grave empty. Where they had expected to hear the silence of death's mockery, they were met by an astonishing message that the crucified one was raised from the dead, that their hope was victorious over humiliation, and that Jesus lives and is leading the way into an unexpected, surprising future with God.

Jesus lives and resurrection hope beckons. Jesus' resurrection on the third day signals that God is not finished until the life of Jesus renews the whole creation. Sinners once haunted by the threats of judgment will live forgiven, restored, renewed and freed. All lives broken by sin's injustices and haunted by death's terrors will be transformed by joy and transfigured into the new creation in Christ.

You and I are witnesses of this new creation. You have been baptized into Jesus' death and resurrection and have heard his promise. Your lives are hidden in his and he feeds you with a foretaste of the eternal feast of joy. He will meet you in your hope. He claims your daily work and makes it into a holy calling. He lives in you and sends you into the world as an ambassador of reconciliation, a testimony of God's incomparable love. Jesus lives! Your life in him is resurrection witness.

"This is our God; let us rejoice and be glad in his salvation!" ~ Isaiah 25:9

WEDNESDAY LENTEN SERVICES

This Lenten journey we will be using a resource written by a woman with whom I was ordained, *Reclaiming the 'L' Word* by Kelly Fryer.

She writes, "Monday through Friday the traffic report sounds like this: 'If you're supposed to be at work by nine, I hope you've left your house by now...it's bad out there!'.... I have a vision of my own. Cars backed up for miles, bumper to bumper on a Sunday morning. And that guy in the traffic helicopter hovering overhead, reporting happily from the sky, "Well, folks, if you're on your way to a nine o'clock service this morning, I sure hope you've already left your house. It's madness out there!'" Wouldn't that be wonderful!

The ELCA Division for Research and Evaluation spent 10 years studying growing churches. While things like how well you keep your church or what style of worship you have may be important, they are not the deciding factors. The one determinant is, "whether or not a church has a clear enough vision of where God wants it to go that it is willing to do whatever it takes to follow wherever God leads."

Fryer suggests that one begins the journey by "remembering who we are. This will happen as we turn to Scripture and to our theological tradition. This will happen as we turn to one another in meaningful and lively conversation. This will happen as we turn to God in prayer. And it will happen only as each one of us takes responsibility for doing these things."

With Kelly, I too believe that God would love to see a world full of traffic jams as people venture out to get to church. If you would like to see such a phenomena, why don't you join us Wednesday mornings at 11:00 a.m. this Lent (and a little bit beyond) as we begin the journey with a conversation or two.

Caritas "Feinstein Challenge"

Caritas implores you to address hunger "close to home" in our Stateline Community during these next two months of the Feinstein Foundation Challenge grant availability. Did you know?

- * Rock County is experiencing an 8.1 % unemployment rate; this is the highest percentage of unemployment in the State of WI
- * Business closings, layoffs, hiring freezes and reduction from full time to part time hours are happening in the workforce
- * Families are growing in size as they experience layoffs or job loss and have to return to family members homes to help them survive these lean times

- * In this first month of the year, 67 new families have come to Caritas for assistance
- * Caritas has seen an increase of 58 more households from our food pantry in the first month of the New Year
- * Cost of food purchased by Caritas in 2008 cost \$89,343 which is up 18 percent from the previous year.

During the months of March 1 through April 30, 2009, Caritas will be campaigning to end hunger in our Stateline by promoting giving food and funds to the Food Pantry. These are tough economic times, and many people are struggling. With your support through this season we can help others find nutritional support.

This year we have set a goal of \$49,000, which will help us purchase food for half a year of operation. We anticipate an increase in client need unlike any we have seen in the past as the economy continues to work out its financial woes. Once again, this year we will have opportunity to request support from the Feinstein Foundation when the campaign season ends. Food donations will be given the value of \$1 per item and money will be counted at face value.

We invite everyone who can make a gift to Caritas, large or small, please help us alleviate hunger in our Stateline.


